



STEP ONE: Gather your materials!

You will need:

- Clean and dry plastic bottle (any kind or size will do)
- Jute twine (or another natural fiber string)
- Bird seed
- Exacto knife
- Scissors (not pictured)
- Permanent marker
- A wooden dowel (or bamboo skewer or pencil)
- A hole punch
- Birdseed
- Acrylic paints (optional)

STEP TWO: Draw the openings.

You will need:

Permanent marker

Instructions:

- Using the marker, draw an outline of the window(s)/opening
 (s) you want to cut.
- A smaller bottle probably only needs one window. A larger bottle can use one or two windows on opposite sides.
- If you are making a bird house, create only one window.





STEP THREE: Cut out the windows.

We recommend that an adult complete this step.

You will need:

Exacto knife

Instructions:

- Using your knife, *carefully* cut around the outline you drew for your windows.
- A pair of scissors may be handy in cutting out the windows.

STEP FOUR: Make holes for the perch.

Adult assistance required for this step.

You will need:

- Hole punch (optional)
- Exacto knife

Instructions:

- You will make 2 holes directly across from each other.
- Using a hole punch, make a hole centered below the open window about 1/4 to 1/2 inch down.
- If you only have one window (or if you don't have a hole punch) carefully use your knife to cut an X through the plastic in the appropriate place.







STEP FIVE: Create a hanger.

You will need:

Two pieces of jute twine (each about 7 inches long)

Instructions:

- Tie the end of one piece of twine around the neck of the bottle below the cap. Push it to one side.
- Do the same thing with the other piece of twine, pushing it to the opposite side of the bottle.
- Gather the two dangling ends and tie them together at the top of the bottle.

STEP SIX: Paint the bird feeder! (optional)

You will need:

- Acrylic paints
- Paint brush
- Cup of water
- Paper towels

Instructions:

• Paint a beautiful design on your bird feeder.





STEP SEVEN: Insert the perch and add birdseed.

You will need:

- Wooden dowel (or pencil or bamboo skewer)
- Birdseed

Instructions:

- Insert the wooden dowel through the holes you made in STEP FOUR.
- Fill the bottom of the bottle with birdseed.

STEP EIGHT:

Hang your birdfeeder outside and watch for hungry birds!

TIP:

Don't have bird seed? Make a bird house instead by placing a natural fiber material (such as moss, lichen, dead grass, grass clippings, dead leaves, or straw) into the bottom of the bottle.
