

Tasting History by Max Miller






Mona Lisa Saloy: Red Beans and Ricely Yours





Libraries Change Lives

Provided to sit at the feet of older family members and listen to stories about her ancestors. By paying close attention, Marian was able to capture her ancestor's oral history and eventually write and publish dozens of books. Each one of her books covers

either her family or her husband's family and their experiences. Marian shares, "The books aren't just about my family but family in general." Marian's first published book, Cultural Gumbo: Our Roots, Our Stories, goes back to the era before Africans were brought west as slaves. Her inspiration for writing is so that her children, grandchildren, and the world can learn, not just their family history, but also Black history.

When Marian began her writing journey, she went to the Library to find books on topics related to certain

time periods and family members. The librarians in the Black Heritage Room at the Scotlandville Branch Library offered much assistance in her pursuits. When Marian wanted specific information about her motherin-law for her book, a staff member pointed her in the direction of the Louisiana Archives where she was able to find information that she used in her book, *Cultural Gumbo*. "Whatever topic I asked for, they would research it, and then I would go find the books." With many of her books highlighting family, much of her research included looking for her ancestors to fill in the gaps. "I also took a computer course at the Main

Library, and I learned a plethora of information about how to research ancestors."

With all of the help Marian received, she was able to complete her books and decided to dedicate a couple of her books to the librarians that helped her so much along the way. Her dedication in Cultural Gumbo: Our Roots. Our Stories states: "I am grateful to the genealogy staff in the East Baton Rouge Parish Main Library on Goodwood Boulevard and the library staff, Carol, Chad, and Jennifer at the Scotlandville Branch

Library on Scenic Highway, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, who are commended for their assistance in researching data." Marian encourages other authors to use the Library as a resource "because I feel that they're going to steer you in the right direction to get the information that you need."




Tuesday, April 2 at 1 p.m. – Virtually step into the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History with Curator Paula Johnson as she discusses the book, *Smithsonian American Table: The Foods, People, and Innovations That Feed Us.* American Table is a sweeping history of food and culture that summons everyone to the table for a fresh look at some of the people, ingredients, events, and movements that have shaped how and what we eat. Johnson, curator and project director of the American Food History Project, will discuss several stories featured in the volume, with an emphasis on those that intersect most directly with the Smithsonian's research, collecting,



and programming around food history. After this enlightening, enriching, and entertaining webinar, you can cook your way through the recipes that are featured in the volume that reflect American history and culture.



Tuesday, April 9 at 1 p.m. – Join us for a one-of-a-kind conversation with National Book Award-winner Colum McCann as he is joined by Diane Foley, the inspiration behind the heartrending book, *American Mother. American Mother* is the story of a mother who, in the course of confronting her son's killer, gets to the elemental heart of violence and forgiveness. Diane Foley is the mother of Jim, a freelance journalist captured and beheaded by ISIS in 2014, an image that became one of the most iconic of the 21st century. Seven years later, Diane gets the chance to spend three days with the murderer of her son in a Virginia courthouse, inspiring her to tell her life story. What unfolds is one of



the most compelling narratives in recent literary history, channeled into searing reality by *New York Times* bestselling author Colum McCann, who brings us on a journey of strength, resilience, and radical empathy.

Wednesday, April 17 at 7 p.m. – We cannot wait for you to join us as we chat with award-winning and bestselling author Xochitl Gonzalez about her newest novel *Anita de Monte Laughs Last*. In 1985, Anita de Monte, a rising star in the art world, is found dead in New York City; her tragic death is the talk of the town. Until it isn't. By 1998 Anita's name had been all but forgotten—certainly by the time Raquel, a third-year art history student was preparing her final thesis. On College Hill, surrounded by privileged students whose futures are already paved out for them, Raquel feels like an outsider. Students of color, like her, are the minority there, and the pressure to work



twice as hard for the same opportunities is no secret. But when Raquel becomes romantically involved with a well-connected older art student, she finds herself unexpectedly rising up the social ranks. As she attempts to straddle both worlds, she stumbles upon Anita's story, raising questions about the dynamics of her own relationship, which eerily mirrors that of the forgotten artist. Moving back and forth through time and told from the perspectives of both Anita and Raquel, this is a novel (and a conversation) that you don't want to miss.

The East Baton Rouge Master Gardeners invites you to its Library series on Thursday, April 4 at 6:30 p.m. at the Zachary Branch for two presentations, "Cutting Gardens" and "Raised Beds." Join Master Gardener Joy Boudreaux for "Cutting Gardens." Joy was born in New Orleans to parents who were both camellia judges and eventually became one of the youngest camellia judges at the age of 15! She will show you many of the tricks she has learned in selecting and growing plants that will produce wonderful flowers to grace your home. Following Joy will be Advanced Master Gardener Kerry Hawkins with a presentation on "Raised Beds." He will discuss the variety of things you can grow "stuff" in! He will delve into not only raised beds but containers of all kinds. Explore with him the commonalities and differences, and see visual examples of each type of container. You are only limited by your imagination.

"Sensory Gardens" and "House Plants" will be presented on Thursday, April 18 at 5:30 p.m. at the Carver Branch. Have you ever listened to your garden? Master Gardener Lynn Pennington will show you how to make your garden awaken all of your senses. She will explain not only what to plant but where to plant it, and the various sensory features that can be important to the elderly, especially those with dementia. Children also love tasting, smelling and feeling the wonders of the garden. Next will be Master Gardener Kelly Hebert with a talk on "House Plants." Kelly got one houseplant that quickly turned into 100. She will share tips on house plant care, details about some of her personal favorites, and some of the heartiest house plants you can own, for those who have trouble keeping them alive.







Interior Space: Photographs by Roland Miller

LSU Museum of Art presents Interior Space: Photographs by Roland Miller, on view April 8 – July 28 at the Shaw Center for the Arts. During a project documenting the Space Shuttle program in 1998, Miller was able to shoot several sections of the International Space Station (ISS) while they were being produced in the Space Station

Processing Facility at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. Fascinated with the complex structure that would soon be orbiting the Earth, he returned over the next several years, continuing to capture images of additional modules. In 2014, he had a fateful meeting with astronaut Dr. Cady Coleman, who challenged Miller to devise a method to photograph the ISS from the viewpoint of those serving on board. Together with Italian astronaut, Paolo Nespoli, who was an ISS resident, Miller developed a system where Nespoli used a digital camera tethered to a laptop to transmit the images to Earth. The exhibition *Interior Space* will include a selection of the photographs captured during the project. The show has an accompanying book, *Interior Space: A* Visual Exploration of the International Space Station by Roland Miller and Paolo Nespoli.

Fierce Planets: Work from the Studio Art Quilt **Associates**

In conjunction with the *Interior Space* exhibit, LSU MOA will exhibit *Fierce Planets*: Work from the Studio Art Quilt Associates, on view April 18 – July 28 at the Shaw Center

for the Arts. The juried exhibition, *Fierce Planets*, features fiber art inspired by the work of Dr. Sabine Stanley, the Bloomberg Distinguished Professor at Johns Hopkins University in the Department of Earth and Planetary Sciences and the Space Exploration Sector of the Applied Physics Lab, and author of the book, What's Hidden *Inside Planets*. Responding to a call from the Studio Art Quilt Associates, Inc. (SAQA), artists from across the globe designed forty-two intricate objects inspired by planets and space. Their interpretations vary wildly, and include traditional quilts, fabric assemblages, and soft sculptures made using a variety of materials and Mary Tyler, BANG



techniques. Objects and artifacts from LSU's Department of Physics and Astronomy and Geology and Geophysics, including a tile from a Space Shuttle and meteorites, will accompany the artwork, allowing the viewer to glean a deeper appreciation and knowledge of space and the formation of planets. The LSU Museum of Art is the premiere venue, with the exhibition expected to travel nationally and internationally over the next several years.




