The Legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.







Wednesday, January 15 at 6 p.m. – Come have a magical moment with *New York Times* bestselling author TJ Klune as he chats about his *Cerulean Chronicles*, with special emphasis on his newest in the series, *Somewhere Beyond the Sea*. Arthur Parnassus lives a good life built on the ashes of a bad one. He's the headmaster of a strange orphanage on a distant and peculiar island, and he hopes to soon be the adoptive father to the six dangerous and magical children who live there. Arthur works hard and loves with his whole heart so none of the children ever feel the neglect and pain that he once felt as an orphan on that very same island so long ago. But when Arthur is summoned to make a public statement about his dark

past, he finds himself at the helm of a fight for the future that his family, and all magical people, deserve. *Somewhere Beyond the Sea* is a story of resistance, lovingly told, about the daunting experience of fighting for the life you want to live and doing the work to keep it.

Thursday, January 23 at 1 p.m. – Join us as we chat with the *New York Times bestselling* author, Amanda Montell about her newest book, *The Age of Magical Overthinking: Notes on Modern Irrationality*. In a delicious blend of cultural criticism and personal narrative that explores our cognitive biases and the power, disadvantages, and highlights of magical thinking, Amanda Montell now turns her erudite eye to the inner workings of the human mind in her most personal and electrifying work yet. "Magical thinking" can be broadly defined as the belief that one's internal thoughts can affect unrelated events in the external world. In all its forms, magical thinking works in service of restoring agency amid chaos, but in *The Age of Magical Overthinking*,



Montell argues that in the modern information age, our brain's coping mechanisms have been overloaded, and our irrationality turned up to an eleven. If you have all but lost faith in our ability to reason, Montell aims to make some sense of the senseless. To help quiet the cacophony for a while, or even hear a melody in it.

Tuesday, January 28 at Noon – You're writing a book (or thinking about it), but what happens next? Join us for an inside look into working with an agent and the beginning stages of the publishing process with Seth Fishman, Vice President and Literary Agent at The Gernert Company. Their client list is as broad as the market, and they represent fiction, both literary and commercial (such as Liz Moore, John Grisham, Louise Penny, Cixin Liu), as well as general nonfiction and practical nonfiction genres. In this presentation, Fishman will deep dive into what happens after you've signed with a literary agent. He will cover many topics, including but not limited to: what agents are and are not looking for, how to submit



your work to an agent and when, what to expect after you've both said "yes!" to working together, and what you can look forward to as you ready your work with an eye towards submitting to publishers, including the revision process and so much more. This extended 90-minute presentation includes 30 minutes of Q&A. This is the year to make all of your publishing dreams come true.

Libraries Change Lives

If you ever find yourself at the Fairwood Branch Library on a Thursday morning, you may just hear dulcet dulcimer melodies drifting through the air. The Red Stick Strummers have been meeting there since 2021 under the leadership of Maylee Samuels, founder of the Lagniappe Dulcimer Society.

Maylee's passion for playing the dulcimer began 30 years ago when she and her husband traveled to North Carolina on vacation. "We stopped by an old-timey gas station, and there were dulcimers hanging on the wall. I bought one and brought it home to Louisiana, but I had a hard time finding anyone in Louisiana who knew how to play it." Maylee was undeterred. She journeyed back to North Carolina and attended a week-long dulcimer workshop at Appalachian State University. She took her newfound knowledge and began teaching the dulcimer as an LSU Leisure Class. Maylee adds, "Eventually, I did meet people in the Baton Rouge area who owned dulcimers, but the instruments were mainly hidden away in closets or garages, or maybe hung on the wall for decoration." But she encouraged others to actually learn to play their dulcimers. And they did, to their (and her) delight!

Today, the Lagniappe Dulcimer Society thrives as its members practice weekly at the Fairwood Branch and perform at many local venues like nursing homes, retirement centers, churches, festivals, and farmers markets. Red Stick Strummer Linda Frederick remembers her first performance. "I was *so* nervous! I don't know how I did it!" In hindsight, she is glad she stepped out of her comfort zone and tried something new.

In addition to the sense of accomplishment that the musicians feel, the sense of community is what they appreciate most about the group. Strummer Glynnis Coleman shares a funny story about how she joined the group. "My sister saw in *The Source* that dulcimer classes were being offered at the Library. She convinced me to go with her because 'we needed

to get out of the house more.' Well, I showed up for the class, but my sister didn't." Glynnis is still strumming at the Library over a year later. The members agreed that playing together beats playing alone for many reasons,

such as socialization and expansion of skill set.

Although the group has been together for around 15 years, after Covid they found themselves in need of a new place to practice. Maylee explained, "We had not explored possibilities at the Library pre-Covid, but we soon realized what a gold mine it is! It's quiet, safe, and centrally

located for our members." She gives credit to Fairwood Branch Manager Kimberly Reeves for being so helpful and cooperative as they worked on making meeting room reservations. Maylee also mentioned that members sometimes check out books on music after practice and that the Library offering 20 free copies/prints per day helps when reproducing sheet music for the group.

Not only do they meet for practice, but the Lagniappe Dulcimer Society offers classes at the Library, too! Be on the lookout this spring for fourweek courses for beginners. No musical background is necessary, and a dulcimer will be provided with advanced registration. "The dulcimer is easy to play. I always say, 'If you can count to ten, you can play the dulcimer,'" laughs Maylee. "It's easy to handle, too. It just sits on your lap."

With help from people like Maylee, the Library accomplishes its mission of bringing the community together.

Student Library Card Update

As required by ACT 436, the East Baton Rouge Parish Library is now issuing new library cards for ALL minor children aged 0-17. You may update the card status at your convenience at any Library location.

Parents must choose between several card categories:

- Current, Standard Card
- Computer Use Only Card
- Restricted Card AKA "Bookshelf" Card
- Unrestricted Card AKA "Explore" Card

In order to keep your child's *current* card active as a Standard Card, a Computer Use Only Card, OR as a STUDENT eCard, parents or guardians may simply contact the Circulation Department at cardmaintenance@ebrpl. com to indicate this approved status. No new plastic card is required. A form is also available on the website at **ebrpl. com/parentalconsent**, as well as more information about each type of card.

In order to switch to either the new Restricted or Unrestricted status, parents or guardians must come into the Library of your choice with their minor child and complete a new application; parents should present a photo ID and proof of current address to Circulation staff at that time.

As of December 2024, 17,800 cards have been updated.



Pinpointing the Stars Exhibition


